Maria Rodriguez won the 9 patch blocks from the last Challenge.



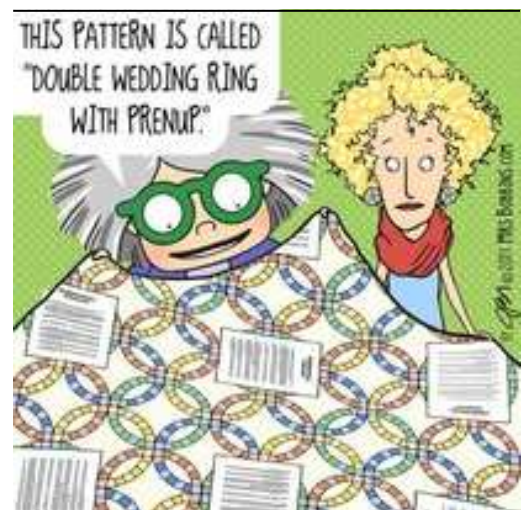
